## From Then to Now...

On 1 October 1902, Starnberg and Wolfratshausen became two independent royal counties, superseding the previously dissolved royal county of Munich II, as decreed by Prince Regent Luitpold of Bavaria in a royal ordinance. Today the county still covers the area thus outlined.

When the local government was restructured in 1972, the formerly independent municipalities of Bachhausen and Höhenrain were taken out of what was formerly Wolfratshausen County into Starnberg County. The restructuring of 1978 then reduced the number of municipalities from the 42 original ones to 14.

Starnberg County is one of the most attractive of the 20 counties in the administrative region of Upper Bavaria, thanks to its generously appointed vacation areas in the region »StarnbergAmmersee«. Nearly three quarters of the county are under environmental protection and nature conservation.

The visitor will encounter a varied and intact landscape in which to relax. In addition to its attractiveness as a vacation area, the county is a highly sought-after residential area due to its proximity to the state capital Munich on the one hand, and to the Alps on the other.

## Starnberg County Coat of Arms



On the Bavarian shield of diamonds, a lion pacing above, a one-headed golden eagle below.

The Bavarian diamonds symbolize the county's affiliation with the Duchy of Bavaria since the mid-13th century. The lion and the eagle were the heraldic animals on the crest of the Counts of Andechs.

## The Starnberg County Hall Logo



The logo of Starnberg County Hall consists of two elements:

1. The Starnberg County Hall typogram STA
2. The second line »Landratsamt Starnberg« (meaning Starnberg County Hall)

Starnberg County Hall is a modern Bavarian local authority, facing up to the challenges of our time. The new image is meant to convey this tradition being carried forward in a dynamic manner.

The abbreviation STA has an undeniable identity, representing both the County Hall and Starnberg County. The color blue naturally implies Bavaria, the sky, and water, and is therefore closely linked to the Starnberg five lakes region. Blue is also the color of a consolidated constitution and at the same time is an element of the coat of arms of Starnberg County.
